





SFP 10-14 Results - YOUTH

EBP

- Significantly lower rates of alcohol, tobacco, and marijuana use
- Skills learned and strong parent-child relations continue to increase over time
- Youth had significantly few conduct problems in school



SFP 10-14 Results - PARENTS

EBP

- Parent gains in parenting skills
- Parents show an increase in positive feelings towards their child
- Parents increase skills in general child management
- Parents show gains in child management

2017 CPWI COMMUNITY SURVEY PLANNING & REVISION



What is the CPWI Community Survey?

- Yearly survey administered by CPWI community coalitions
 - Fielded September 1st – December 31st
- Captures local attitudes about teen alcohol & drug use and prevention programming
- Data informs coalition's prevention strategies



Survey Questionnaire

- Core Survey
 - Longer survey on even-number years, shorter survey on odd-number years
- Survey Modes
 - Online via Survey Monkey
 - Paper and pen/pencil
 - Coordinators enter data from hard copy surveys using a separate online survey link we set up for that purpose



Survey Questionnaire

- Languages
 - Online: English & Spanish
 - Hard copy: English, Spanish, and additional languages.
 - In 2016: Cambodian/Khmer, Chinese, Somali, Russian, Vietnamese
- Coalition-added questions
 - Can add questions to the end of the Core survey to create a “coalition-specific survey”
 - We recommend not adding more than 10 questions
 - Coalitions provide added-question translations

2018 HYS revision timeline

- May 31st – Question Proposal form and Revision Matrix/Survey due.

1. **State Targeted Response (STR) to Opioid Crisis**

- 1 year contract
- 60% E/RBP and 40% Promising program requirement

2. **Dedicated Marijuana Account (DMA) SUD Prevention**

- Single-site or Multisite
- \$20k each up to \$100k max for multiple sites
- School or community based
- 2 year contracts
- Encouraged to work with CPWI
- 85% E/RBP and 15% Promising program requirement

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



May 2017 Legislative Update

- Regular Session Ended 4/23/17
- 1st Special Session began 4/24/17
- 2nd Special Session began 5/23/17, ends 6/22/17
- Possible 3rd Special Session
- Issues to be resolved:
 - Operating Budget
 - McCleary Decision
 - Others if Necessary to Implement Budget (NTIB)
- **Budget Deadline 6/30/17**



May 2017 Legislative Update

- Governor Inslee signed ESSB 5131 – Marijuana Advertising Restrictions bill on 5/16/17
 - Bans all outdoor advertising
 - Sign spinners, mascots, machines, inflatables
 - Arenas, Stadiums, Malls, Fairs, Transit Locations, Farmers Markets
 - Prohibits direct/indirect advertising to youth and to out of state residents
 - Allows billboards with only:
 - Business/Trade name
 - Location/Directions
 - Nature of business
 - Prohibits marijuana plants or products
 - Cities, Counties, and Towns may adopt more restrictive outdoor advertising rules and enforce those rules.
