**Background Information of the Annual Action Plan Matrix and Working Definitions:** The following action plan is designed to explain the goals, objectives, strategies, and activities and programs that the San Juan Island community coalition wishes to accomplish. The following definitions provide context for the matrix that follows. The matrix was developed by the Department of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR) for the Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative (CPWI). Please note that the definitions followed by (NRC & IOM) are from the glossary in the *Preventing Mental, Emotional, and Behavioral Disorders Among Young People, Progress and Possibilities* (2009, National Research Council and Institute of Medicine).

The format for the Action Plan matrix is: **Goal → Objective → CSAP Strategy → Activities and Methods**

- Goal:** A goal is a statement that explains what the community wishes to accomplish or change about the **intervening variable (Risk or Protective Factor)**. The goal sets the direction for the intermediate outcome that may be achieved within a two to five (2-5) year period of time. (2014, DBHR) The terms intervening variables and risk and protective factors are used interchangeably.
- Risk Factor:** A characteristic at the biological, psychological, family, community, or cultural level that precedes and is associated with a higher likelihood of problem outcomes. (NRC & IOM, p. xxviii)
- Protective Factor:** A characteristic at the biological, psychological, family, community (including peers and culture) level that is associated with a lower likelihood of problem outcomes or that reduces the negative impact of a risk factor on problem outcomes. (NRC & IOM, p. xxvii)
- Objective:** An objective addresses the local condition and break down the goal into smaller parts that provide specific, measurable actions through which the goal will be accomplished. Objectives define what the coalition expects to achieve through the coalition's efforts. Objectives are meant to set direction for the short-term (six months – two years) outcomes with realistic targets. (2014, DBHR)
- CSAP Strategy:** The Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP) has defined six strategies that when used together, can form a comprehensive prevention program: **Information Dissemination, Prevention Education, Alternate Activities, Community-Based Processes, Environmental Approaches, and Problem Identification and Referral**. Each CSAP (Center of Substance Abuse) Strategy is grounded in research through the direction of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA). <http://beta.samhsa.gov/about-us> (June 5, 2014)

## **CSAP Strategy Definitions (continued): Six Center of Substance Abuse Prevention Strategies**

The following definitions are summaries from *Substance Abuse Prevention, The Intersection of Science and Practice* (2003, Hogan, Gabrielsen, Luna, Grothaus, pages 30-31)

- **Information Dissemination:** This strategy includes providing information about the nature and extent of drug use, abuse, and addiction and the effects on individuals, families, and communities. It also provides information of available prevention programs and services. The dissemination of information is characterized by one-way communication from the source to the audience, with limited contact between the two. Methods for this strategy include information resource centers, resource directories, media campaigns, brochures, radio and television public service announcements, workplace programs, speaking engagements and health fairs.
- **Prevention Education:** This strategy involves two-way communication and is distinguished from merely disseminating information by the fact that it is based on an interaction between the educator and the participants. Activities under this strategy aim to affect critical life and social skills, including decision making, refusal, and critical analysis skills. Methods used for this strategy include classroom and small group sessions, parenting and family management classes, peer leader and peer helper programs, education programs for youth groups, and groups for children of substance abusers.
- **Alternate Activities:** This strategy intends to have target populations participate in activities that are alcohol-, tobacco-, and other drug-free. There is an assumption that constructive and healthy activities offset the attraction to drugs. Methods include youth and adult leadership activities, and drug-free social and recreation activities. Alternatives should be part of a comprehensive plan.
- **Community-Based Processes:** This strategy aims to enhance the ability of the community to provide more effective prevention and treatment services for substance abuse disorders. Activities and methods used in this strategy include organizing, planning, enhancing efficiency and effectiveness of services implementation, interagency collaboration, coalition building, and networking, through trainings, multi-agency coordination and collaboration.
- **Environmental Approaches:** This strategy seeks to establish or change community standards, codes, and attitudes, thereby influencing the incidence and prevalence of substance abuse in the general population. Methods used for this strategy include establishment and review of drug policies in schools, technical assistance to communities to maximize local enforcement procedures governing the availability and distribution of drugs, the review and modification of alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco advertising practices, and product pricing strategies.
- **Problem Identification and Referral:** This strategy aims to identify those who have indulged in the illegal use of drugs in order to determine whether their behavior can be reversed through education or whether they need a referral for a chemical dependency assessment. Methods used for this strategy include driving-while-impaired education programs and student assistance programs.
