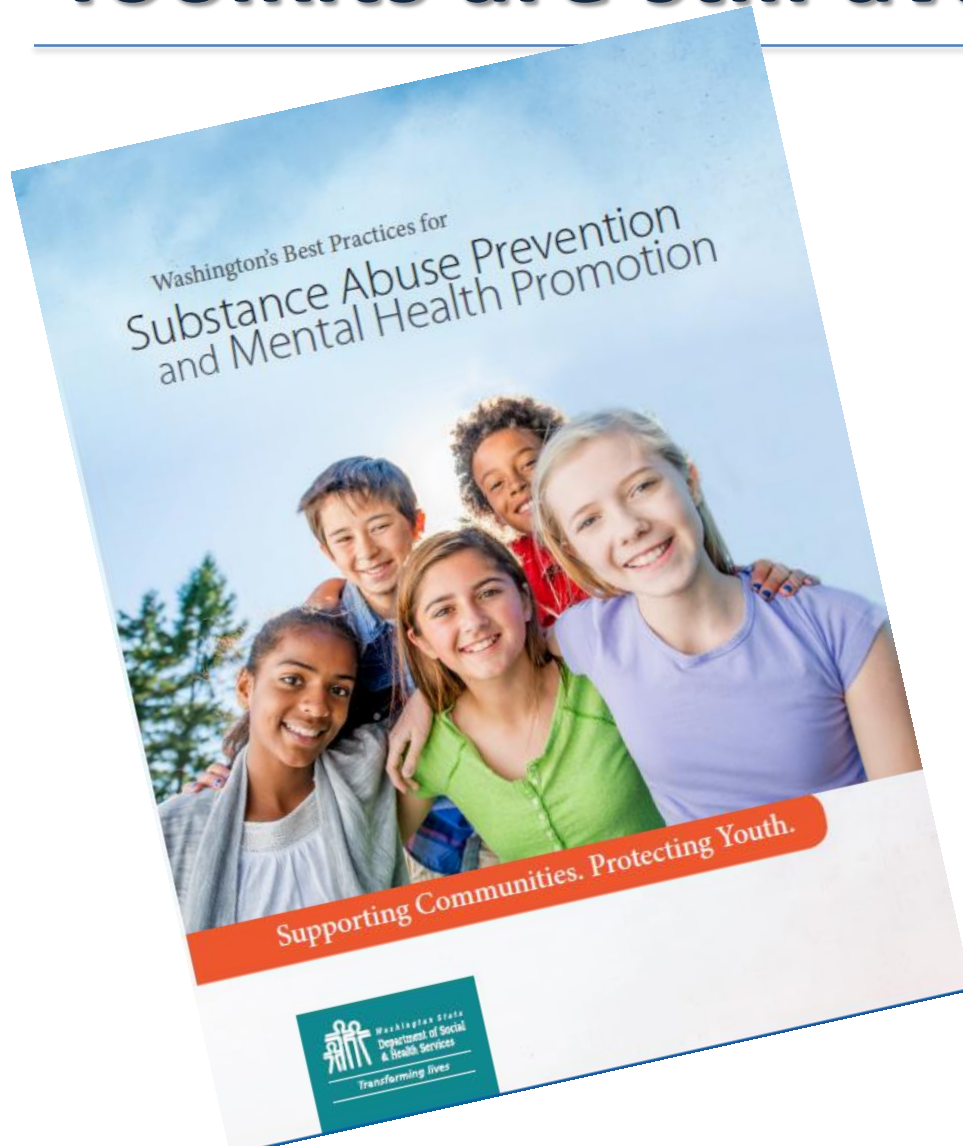

Guidance for *Participant Upload*

- Participants can be entered into Minerva or into an Excel file, then uploaded into Minerva via this module
 - If you have many participants, this could be a time saver
 - It can be used for one or multiple participants
- Steps:
 - Go to the **Import/Export** module
 - Select **Import New File**
 - Select **Date Range** for Activity Logs



Participant Upload (cont.)

- Steps, continued:
 - Select **Get Activity Logs**
 - Use the drop down screen to **select** an Activity Log
 - Select **Click to upload file** section to search for your document on your computer
 - Select **Upload**
 - If there are errors, you'll see **File Contained Errors** in the **Status** column
 - Otherwise, you'll find your participants in the **Enter Session Data** module



Guidance for *Mentoring*

- Mentoring and other one-to-one services (Nurse Family Partnership, Across Ages, ICM, etc.) will be reported using specific Activity Logs
- Steps:
 - Go to the **Implementation** module **Activity Reporting** module
 - Select **Start Log**
 - Create logs for your program to report a series (group) of sessions (services and activities)
 - Next, report on sessions in the **Enter Session Data** module



Mentoring (cont.)

- Steps:
 - Go to the **Enter Session Data** module
 - Select the Activity you want to enter data for and then **Add New Session**
 - You can either **Copy Session Details** from a previous session (by selecting Yes in the pop-up) or **Create a New Session**



Mentoring (cont.)

- Steps:
 - Enter the appropriate data for this session as needed
 - You can also add participants, select those who participated, and fill in survey information as needed
- ➔ Communities implementing mentoring or one-on-one type programs should have services from Oct '16 to Apr '17 entered by **May 31, 2017.**

Quarterly Reporting (cont.)

- Steps:
 - Select the **Implementation** module and then **CPWI Quarterly Reporting**
 - Start a new report using the green **+Start Log** icon (only active programs will appear) or select an existing report to edit



Quarterly Reporting (cont.)

- Notes:
 - **Next** takes you to the next section,
 - **Save** allows you to save your work to finish later,
 - Use **Complete** to finish and submit the report for review.
- Deadlines:
 - ➔ For your 3rd Quarter report (Jan-Mar), enter a roll-up of all the relevant information for Q1, Q2, and Q3.
This is due by **May 31, 2017**.
 - The report for the 4th Quarter (Apr-Jun) is due July 15, 2017.
 - The regular reporting schedule follows the standard state fiscal year schedules. Reports are due by the 15th of the month after the end of the quarter



Environmental Strategies

- We continue to work with the Vendor on how Environmental Strategies and Information Dissemination services will be entered.
 - Program Profiles and Activity Logs will be created the same way as those for direct service programs.

Eligible Communities

Eligible applicants will include local community-based non-profit organizations and public agencies with youth and family-serving capacity who demonstrate excellence in service delivery to high-need communities. Based on a comprehensive review of relevant data, the DSHS/DBHR has identified twenty Washington State communities that meet specific criteria of need for CPWI services to prevent the misuse and abuse of opioid drugs, alcohol and other drugs. **Qualified grant applicants within the following twenty communities identified by school districts or in some cases high school attendance areas and their feeder schools are eligible to apply for this grant funding:**

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES



2017 Regular Legislative Session

- Ended 4/23/17
- 30 Day Special Session began 4/24/17
- Operating Budget
- McCleary Decision
- Necessary to Implement Budget (NTIB)

***Budget Deadline 6/30/17**



2017 Regular Legislative Session

- Around 70 Bills Reviewed
 - 38 Marijuana Bills (3 passed)
 - 16 Alcohol Bills (2 passed)
 - 5 Tobacco/Vapor Bills (1 technical bill passed)
 - 3 Prescription Bills (1 technical bill passed)
 - 3 Mental Health Bills (1 passed)
 - Multiple Others (Budget, Hemp, BHA to HCA)



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **ESSB 5131 – Marijuana Advertising; Licensing; Sharing/Gifting; and other Regulations**
 - Bans all outdoor advertising
 - Sign spinners, mascots, machines, inflatables
 - Arenas, Stadiums, Malls, Fairs, Transit Locations, Farmers Markets
 - Prohibits direct/indirect advertising to youth and to out of state residents
 - Allows billboards with only:
 - Business/Trade name
 - Location/Directions
 - Nature of business
 - Prohibits marijuana plants or products
 - Cities, Counties, and Towns may adopt more restrictive outdoor advertising rules and enforce those rules.



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **ESSB 5131** – Marijuana Advertising; **Licensing**; Sharing/Gifting; and other Regulations
 - Increases the retail license cap from 3 to 5 licenses
 - Requires retail license forfeiture if the business is not fully operational in 9 months
 - Requires LCB notify Tribes regarding pending marijuana business applications, and prohibited from issuing license without permission



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **ESSB 5131 – Marijuana Advertising; Licensing; Sharing/Gifting; and other Regulations**
 - The delivery by a person 21 years of age or older to one or more persons 21 years of age or older, during a 24-hour period, for noncommercial purposes and not conditioned upon or done in connection with the provision or receipt of financial consideration, of any of the following marijuana products, is not a violation of Washington law:
 - **1/2 ounce of useable marijuana;**
 - **8 ounces of marijuana-infused product in solid form;**
 - **36 ounces of marijuana-infused product in liquid form; or**
 - **3.5 grams of marijuana concentrates.**
 - The act of delivery (giving or sharing) must be done by:
 - Outside of the view of the general public in a nonpublic place,
 - OR
 - The marijuana product must be in its original packaging as purchased by the retailer.



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **ESSB 5131** – Marijuana Advertising; Licensing; Sharing/Gifting; and other **Regulations**
 - Hemp Allowances
 - Patients/Providers source seeds and plants from producers
 - Creates WSDA organic production, food processing standards and rulemaking authority for marijuana producers and processors
 - Requires the LCB to conduct study for allowing home grow due to the leg by 12/1/17



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **HB 1250**– Marijuana Lockable Box
 - Authorizing retail marijuana outlets to give a free lockable drug box to adults age twenty-one years and over and to qualifying patients age eighteen years and over subject to restrictions.



2017 Legislature – Passed Marijuana Bills

- **HB 5130**– Increasing Marijuana Licensing Fees
 - Increasing marijuana license fees and adding a temporary additional fee on marijuana licenses issued by the Washington state liquor and cannabis board.



2017 Legislature – Passed Alcohol Bills

- **SHB 1176**– Mead Alcoholic Beverage
 - Defines the alcoholic beverage "mead."
 - Authorizes liquor retail licensees with privileges to sell beer or cider to customers in growlers



2017 Legislature – Passed Alcohol Bills

- **SHB 1038 – Winery Tasting Rooms**
 - Increases, from two to four, the number of separate locations from which a domestic winery may serve samples of its own products, sell its own wine at retail, and sell its own wine in kegs or sanitary containers.



2017 Legislature – Passed Mental Health Bills

- **E2SHB 1612**– Lethal Means, Reduce Access
 - Changes the name of the Safe Homes Task Force to the Suicide-Safer Homes Task Force (Task Force) and revises its membership and duties.
 - Creates a Suicide-Safer Homes Project within the Department of Health to accept public or private donations for deposit in a new account to be used by the Task Force to provide suicide prevention materials, training, and outreach programs.
 - Requires licensed dentists and licensed dental hygienists to complete a onetime training in suicide assessment, treatment, and management, and the University of Washington School of Dentistry to develop training curriculum.
 - Addresses exemptions from background check requirements for firearms transfers between immediate family members and temporary transfers intended to prevent suicide or self-inflicted bodily harm.
