About the Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative (CPWI)

The Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative (CPWI) is a partnership of state agencies, counties, schools and local prevention coalitions supporting communities in preventing alcohol and other drug abuse and its negative consequences. CPWI priorities include reducing underage drinking, marijuana use and opioid misuse/abuse among middle and high school aged youth. By providing evidence-based practices and promoting the positive changes in communities, we can build healthier communities.

About the Coalition: Communities & Schools Working Together

UNITE! Washougal Community Coalition, founded in the spring of 2012, based on community responsiveness and readiness. UNITE! Works together to support youth, encourage families, enrich community, and guide healthy choices. We represent Washougal businesses, youth, public library, school district, faith-based organizations, city government, service clubs, parents and community members.

The Washougal area is experiencing a renaissance, which is evidenced by additional businesses downtown, a new Washougal Business Association, research, development and funding efforts for a new Washougal library, the city of Washougal's investment in promoting tourism, and growing partnerships that serve the interests of a healthy prosperous community. One of these partnerships is the Washougal Waterfront Project, a collaboration between the Port of Camas-Washougal, the city of Washougal and Portland State University to redevelop a 40-acre waterfront parcel.

The Washougal School District, a key partner, recently completed their Long-Range Facility Planning with the 2016 completion of state-of-the art facilities, Excelsior High School, Jemptegaard Middle School, and Columbia River Gorge Elementary. Cape Horn-Skye Elementary and Washougal High School were 2013 Washington Achievement Award winners. Both schools recently recognized in the "High Progress" category for being among the most successful in the state. However, low-income area residents currently continue to face challenges of inaccessibility to social services, most of which are located in Vancouver over 20 miles away miles away, one and a half hours each way by public transportation.



About Our Community

Washougal is set on the edge of a national scenic area that boasts world-class recreation in the form of hiking, mountain biking, fishing, boating, berry picking, birding and more. Washougal is known as "The Gateway to the Gorge." We are proud to have Pendleton Woolen Mills as an area attraction located on the edge of a new developing downtown. The Washougal Waterfront Park is expanding with new lighted walking paths and recreation area. Washougal is poised for growth with the balance of "small town" friendliness and yet an easy driving commute to Portland. The area is also known regionally for recreational activities such as the Motocross Nationals and the Spartan Extreme Fitness Challenge held every summer in the surrounding hills.
