


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About the Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative (CPWI)

About Our Community

The communities of Cle Elum, Ronald, Roslyn and South Cle Elum are located in rural Upper Kittitas County.

Cle Elum means "Swift Water" in the language of the Kittitas Indians. Coal was first noted in Roslyn in 1883. Many UKC residents are descendants of immigrants from Europe who settled here to work in the mines.

Underage drinking and a low perception of risk are a problem in Cle Elum and Roslyn where 34% of 8^{th} - 10^{th} graders say that they do not think regular marijuana use is risky and 35% of 8^{th} - 10^{th} graders say that they do not think regular alcohol use is risky. 49% of 8^{th} - 10^{th} graders have friends that have tried alcohol and 42% of 8^{th} - 10^{th} graders have friends that have tried marijuana. About Prevention Programs in our Community

CPC's goals are to increase prevention leadership in UKC, reduce alcohol and marijuana availability to youth, increase consistent enforcement of policies/regulations related to underage drinking and drug use, decrease the number of friends who use, and increase positive family management practices. CPC seeks to increase community collaboration and youth bonding.

CPC currently supports many programs such as Parenting Wisely, Starts With One & Start Talking Now, Samantha Skunk, Youth Services Mentor Program and more!

CPC also conducts an annual community survey in order to gather data about community change. It also supports the Healthy Youth Survey which provides a youth perspective on community problems and attitudes.
