Our Coalition depends on people just like you. We are your friends, neighbors and colleagues working together on an issue too big for any one person or agency to address on their own.

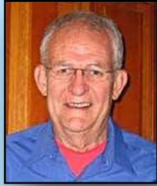
The Coalition and our partners use Healthy Youth Survey data to target effective programs and strategies that are making a difference for youth and families in Monroe.

About Our Community

Using Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction data as a measure of race and ethnicity, we learned that 74% of our residents identify as Caucasian, 17% as Hispanic or Latino, 4% as two or more races, with the remainder identifying as American Indian, Asian, Pacific Islander or African American.

Monroe has more than tripled in size during the past two decades, and continues to grow through immigration, particularly from the Jalisco region of Mexico. Immigrants coming into the community from this region are very likely to speak indigenous languages rather than English or Spanish. Although the median household income of the community is high at \$69,047, the school district's free and reduced lunch rate remains near 30%.

Recent assessment by the Monroe Community Coalition reveals several areas of vulnerability to underage drinking and other substance use that cannot be dismissed as a product of chance. As a result, the Coalition is working with its partners to reduce specific risk factors that influence rates of substance use in our community:

- Community Disorganization
- Family Management Problems
- Rebelliousness
- Early Initiation of Problem Behaviors
- Low Commitment to School

About Prevention Programs in our Community

Monroe Community Coalition's participation in the CPWI has already resulted in substantial benefit to the community, including funding for paid Coalition and school-based staff. This benefit also includes access to:

- The evidence-based PAX Good Behavior Game for Elementary –aged children.
- The best practice brief intervention model "SPORT" program for Middle and High School-aged youth.
- The Coping And Support Training (CAST) Suicide Prevention Program
- The online and in-person Parenting Wisely program.

All Coalition programs are evaluated for effectiveness through the administration of validated pre- and post-test survey instruments.
