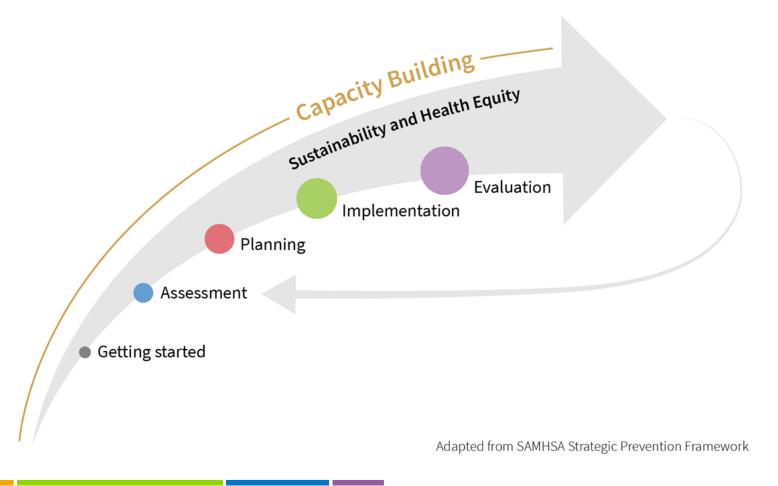

- Sustaining program service delivery <u>is</u>
 - Continued implementation over time
 - ► Achieving and maintaining intended outcomes
 - ► Local skills, knowledge and resources to manage and deliver services
 - ► Community ownership
 - Relevant to a community's needs and interests, and responsive to how those change over time
 - ► What happens after initial funding or support has ended



- Sustaining program service delivery <u>is not</u>
 - Continued program start-up over time
 - ► Evolving intended outcomes
 - ► Reliance on outside skills and knowledge to manage and deliver services
 - ► A lack of awareness in the community
 - ► Maintaining the same program service delivery even as the community's needs and interests change over time
 - ► Re-creating or sustaining the initial funding or support of program start-up
 - ► Checking a box for grant compliance



For Program Service Delivery

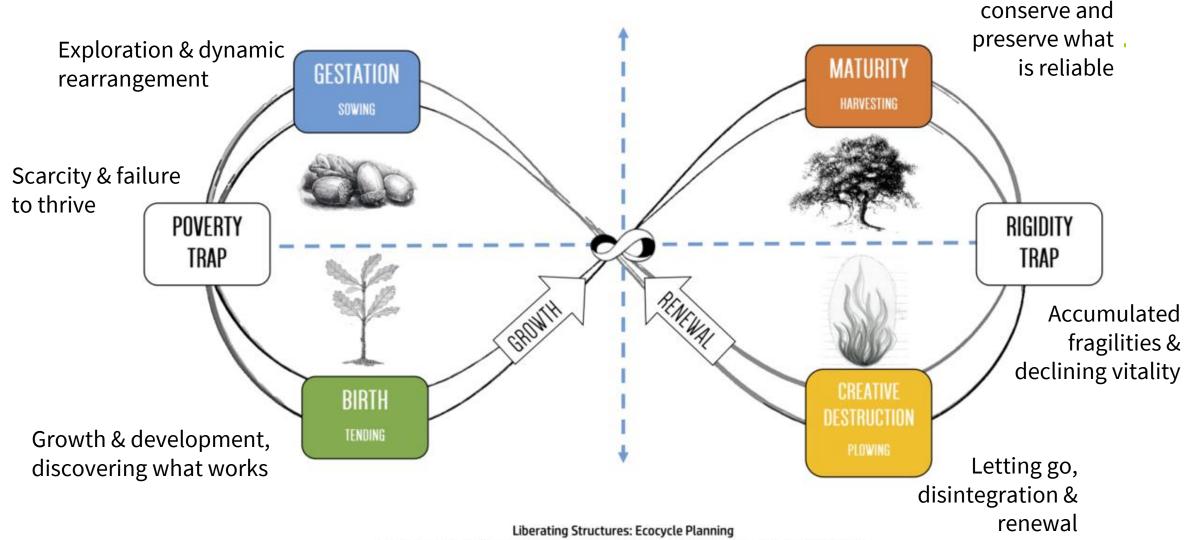


- Tool from *Liberating Structures* to assess your portfolio of activities, programs, and services.
 - ► Activities, programs and strategies are "living things" in our communities
 - ► Every activity, program and strategy goes through different phases.
 - > From birth, to maturity, to creative destruction, and renewal.



- ▶ **Birth:** This phase is characterized by new ideas and initiative. *Program service delivery in this phase requires nurturing, resources and support to grow.*
- ▶ Maturity: This phase is characterized by consistency and clear processes. Program service delivery in this phase requires opportunities to prove their value and stabilize community ownership.
- Creative Destruction: Overtime, some programs no longer serve their intended purpose, become obsolete, or need revamping. This phase is about recognizing what needs to be let go of, rearranging, and making space for new.
- ▶ Renewal: After letting go of what doesn't serve its intended purpose(s), there's space for reflection, learning, and reorientation. New ideas and lessons learned emerge.



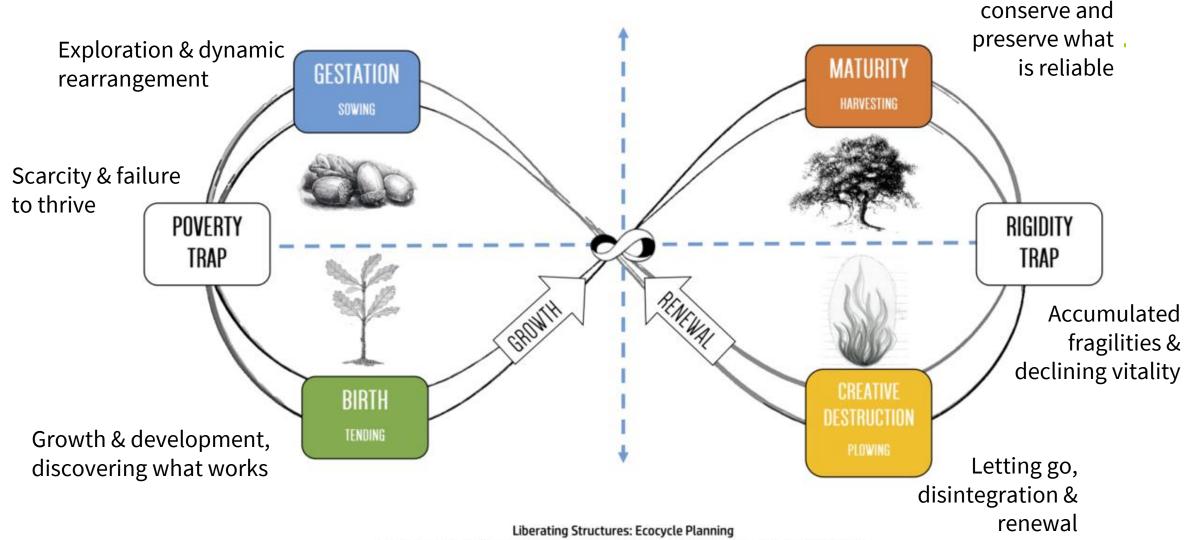

Individual Activity

 - ➤ Micro level insights Specific activities, tasks, metrics; individual and team performance and capacities; immediate actions or decisions (more relevant to "Birth" phase); small barriers that could have cumulative impacts.
 - ➤ Macro level insights Overall approaches or methods to the delivery; broader organization culture, community-wide decision making; measured trends and outcomes (more relevant to "Maturity" phase); barriers like shifting policies or community dynamics.



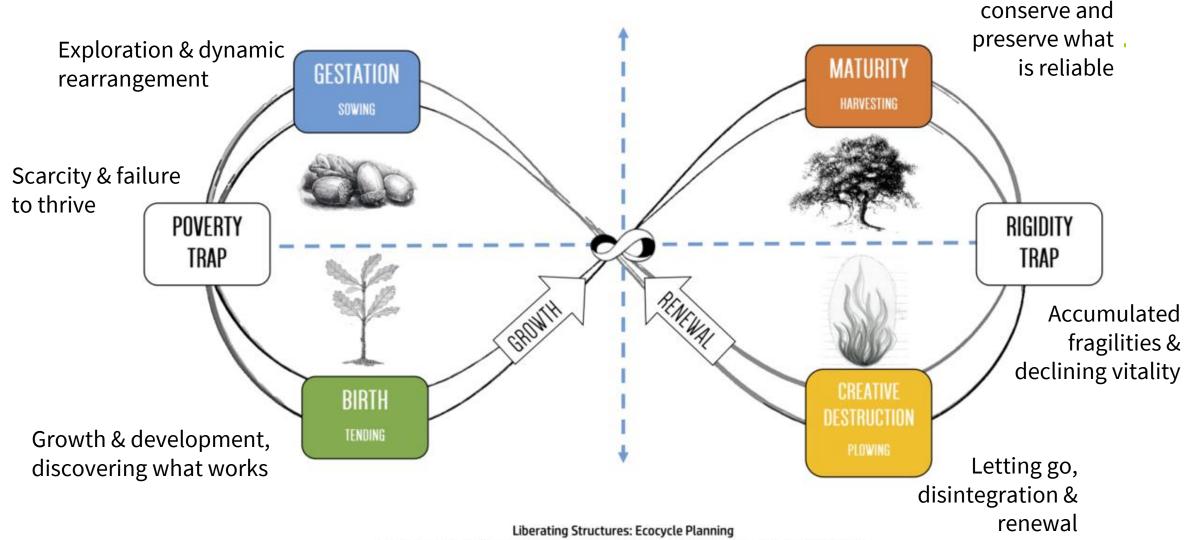

Teams of Two Activity

- ▶ In pairs, take 10 minutes to discuss and analyze the placement of your planned programs.

 - > What has been the trajectory of each program? How has it moved overtime from one phase to another?
 - > What factors have contributed to the successes and challenges of a program?

 - ➤ How are resources (human, financial) being spread across programs? Are there programs in "Creative Destruction" that are not getting rearranged?

 - > If time allow, repeat process with a new "client"
