- Craft options for empowering/engaging the coalition in each step of the strategic planning process






Meeting agreements

- Assume positive intent
- Stay present (participate in discussion)
- Everyone gets a chance to speak
- Everyone listens
- One person talks at a time without interruption
- Respect all perspectives and ideas
- Start and end on time
- Manage personal space (cell phones, emails, other distractions)

Strategic Planning Process

Data

- Priority risk and protective factors
- Priority behavioral outcomes

Resources

- What's already working related to priorities?
- Where are the gaps in services?

The Plan

- Select EBPPPs to fill gaps
- Empower and engage coalition in making decisions together



The big idea

Importance of filling gaps with services we know will work to impact the community's priorities (risk/protective factors and behavioral outcomes)





Filling the gaps

- 1. Started with community data priorities
- 2. Looked to see what resources ALREADY are working to address those priorities
- 3. Identified GAPS in those services:
 - Nothing at all
 - No EBPPPs
 - What's there needs strengthening in some way

Part 2: does it fit, here?

• Which options from these lists are feasible for us to implement?






Impact the community's priorities ...

- And across multiple domains





Other forms of evidence

Sometimes: Push back on EBPPP lists

STARR in 5-Town, Maine:

- Goal: increase community opportunities for positive involvement
- Found PALS on a list of EBPPs but only tested in low income housing projects in big cities
- Worked with developer to adapt to rural area
- Created a change in their local afterschool system by engaging ONE GROUP OF ADULTS AT A TIME
- Offered training for afterschool program providers in the SDS and contingent-based reinforcement
- Ended up with a common registration system, staff training and afterschool transportation system







Balancing with other types of evidence



- Read What Works in Prevention
 https://www.dshs.wa.gov/sites/default/files/publications/documents/22-1662.pdf
- Consult guides for best practices to identify components of effective programs
- Be aware of what DOESN'T work
- Ask for evaluation information from program providers offering services not on 'the lists'
- Respect community voice and experience about what works in specific contexts - use qualitative techniques to listen and learn

How does a coalition make decisions?







30,000 ft view

- Big idea overview of possible range of decision-making options
- One size probably won't fit all
- May want different options for different stages in the process
- Note: we won't be able to get the 'how' to use these options; will be able to describe them





Two Key Elements

- Decision-making rules & values
- Processes for group approvals or decisionmaking








Factors: deciding degree of participation in decisions

- Member buy in needed
- Time Available?
- How important or inconsequential is this issue?
- Information or Expertise needed? Who has it?
- Capability how capable & experienced are people in making decisions as individuals or as a team?
- Building Teamwork? What's the potential of using this issue to build a stronger team?






Degrees of Participation in Decision Making









Our adaptations to this flow:


- We don't incorporate 'blocking' instead we hear concerns and address those as best as possible.
- 2. Only LC members vote, but anyone can list a concern during that first round of discussion.
- 3. We often list our concerns in small groups for discussion first, and then have groups report out any lingering concerns that weren't resolved within their small group for the whole council to hear.

This is where we'd restate any remaining concerns and call for a vote (after all of the concerns have been heard and addressed). Voting = 1) agree, 2) disagree, or 3) stand aside.



Some Voting Options

- Simple majority
- Super-majority: 60%
- Can choose to require must be present to vote (or not – vote via email, survey or phone)
- Can choose to require quorum (50% or more (often 60% or 2/3) of eligible voters are present/vote)
- Can choose to restrict voting eligibility, e.g.:
 - Must have attended meeting(s) in past quarter
 - Must be 'active' member
- Can choose to create rules on communication related to decision-making meetings
 - Required advance notice of X days when decisions will be held at a meeting








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Sample Process



Review example

- 1. Advance work
- 2. Get all ideas out
- 3. Allow adequate processing time
- 4. Take temp!
- 5. Discuss ideas/ concerns
- 6. Decide


