# Addressing High THC Hazards

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- ▶ **Problem:** High concentration THC products pose a higher risk to consumers, especially youth and young adults (higher rates of SUD, psychosis, and negative physical effects)
  - ▶ Comparison: Similar to liquor, high THC cannabis is likely more hazardous for public health than low THC products.
  - ▶ Context: Market share of cannabis concentrates has nearly quadrupled since retail stores opened
  - ▶ Equity: Disproportionate use of high THC among those who report being Latino, low income, or having poor mental health
- ▶ **2SHB 2320:** Concerning High THC Cannabis Products
  - ▶ DOH to develop
    - 1) optional health and safety training for retail staff and
    - 2) point of sale health information
    - 3) public health information campaign aimed at vulnerable populations
  - ▶ UW ADAI to develop and implement guidance and health recommendations for providers and at-risk patients
  - ▶ LCB to collect data on product types, including amount sold and THC content
- ▶ **Intent: Gather and review additional data to consider further action**
  - ▶ What high THC impacts are you seeing in your community?

# Addressing DUI Hazards

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- ▶ **Problem:** Alcohol drastically impairs ability to drive
  - ▶ Risk of fatal collision *increased at least 7x* from BAC 0 to BAC .05-.079
  - ▶ Behavior Change/Norms: When Utah lowered BAC limit to .05, 22% of drivers reported modifying their behavior
  - ▶ International Standard: Most countries have BAC .05 limit and lower DUI fatalities
- ▶ **Bills to lower BAC have gained traction**
  - ▶ 2 BAC bills last session- halfway to passage
  - ▶ Legislature passed ESHB 1493: broad DUI treatment/sentencing reform to expand DUI treatment options

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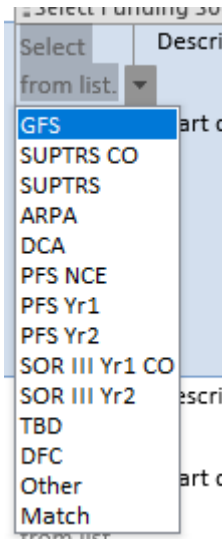

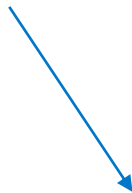

## Community Prevention and Wellness Initiative (CPWI) Overview for New Community Coalition Coordinators

**How did CPWI begin, what is it, and how is it designed?**

CPWI began in 2011 with 18 communities, and has grown to over 100 communities. Under this initiative, the state-funded communities with grant funding are implementing evidence-based substance use disorder prevention programs to help reduce local risk factors for youth and adults and to promote overall health and well-being.

CPWI establishes a community coalition and in collaboration with the local school district (ESD), provides a Student Assistance Professional (SAP) to address decisions about which risk and protective factors to address in the school programs and strategies. A SAP is placed within the school district to provide prevention curriculum, provide intervention services to students, and participate in the community coalition.

CPWI is a strategic partnership of state agencies, counties, and local communities that support communities in preventing alcohol and drug use on multiple factors: research and evidence of what works in prevention and federal resources tied to community-level change. CPWI is a system that continually builds capacity, leverages resources, and provides partners in Washington State and local communities with the tools and support needed to drive community change, while measuring impacts for the purpose of prevention.

- Participating in training and technical assistance required for the coalition

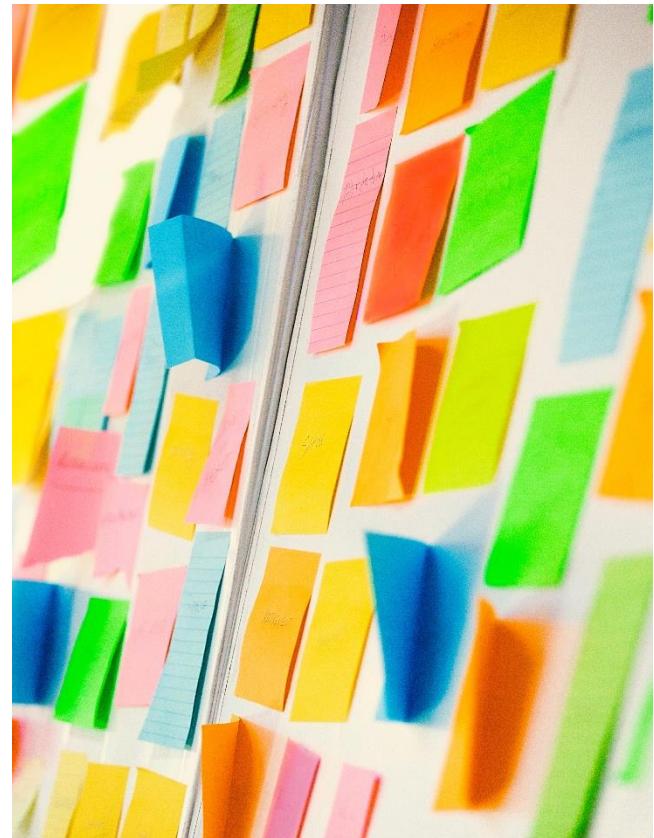

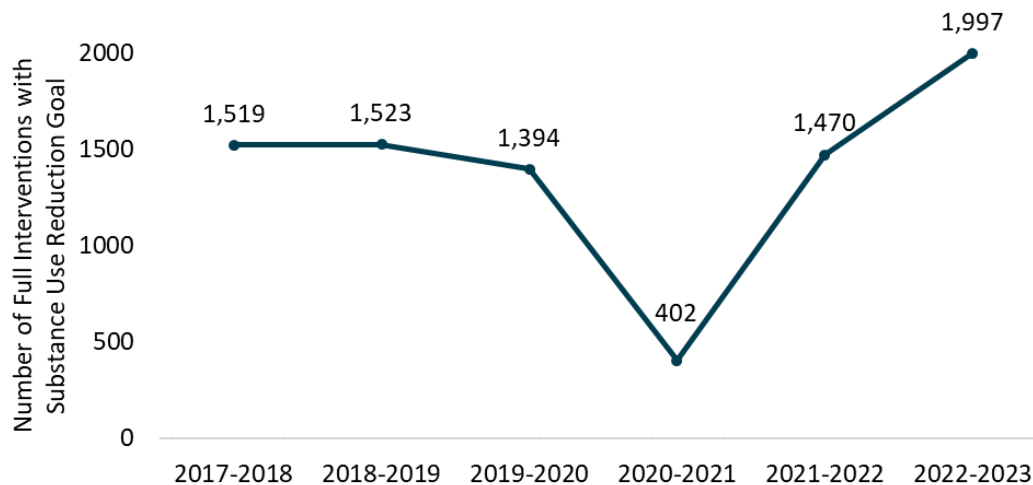
# Universal and Indicated Services

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- ▶ Number of students receiving services:
  - ▶ Universal services – 3,514 total activities
    - 1,678 Awareness activities
    - 487 Education activities
    - 115 Curriculum activities
    - 362 Peer activities
    - 872 Planning activities
  - ▶ Indicated services – 4,196 total interventions
    - 626 Quick interventions
    - 3,570 Full interventions
    - 2,005 Full interventions with a substance use reduction goal

# Indicated Services

- ▶ Students served for indicated services~ full with a substance use reduction goal
- ▶ Number of students receiving full interventions with a substance use reductions goal in Grade 6 through 12:
  - ▶ 1,997 students in 2022-2023
  - ▶ Compared to 1,470 students in 2021-2022



# Survey Response Rates

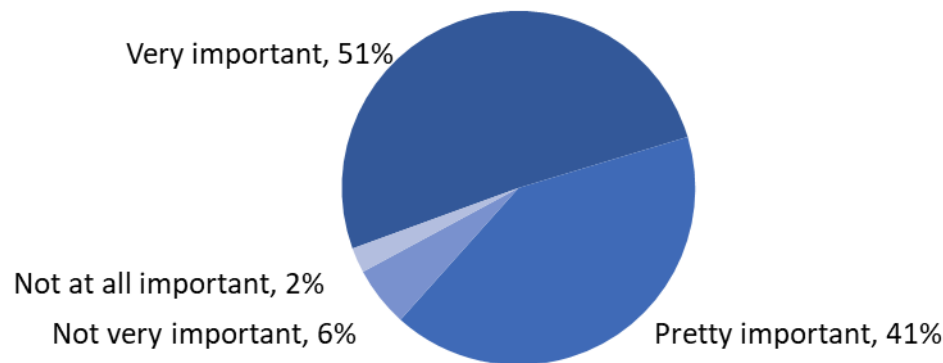
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- ▶ Measure A: A minimum of 60% of students who received selective/indicative services must complete both a pre-test and a post-test.
- ▶ Of the 3,523 Grade 6 through 12 students served in 2022-2023:
  - ▶ 3,114 baseline surveys completed
  - ▶ 2,681 posttest surveys completed
  - ▶ 2,663 completed both a baseline & posttest survey
  - ▶ 76% survey response rate

# Student Satisfaction

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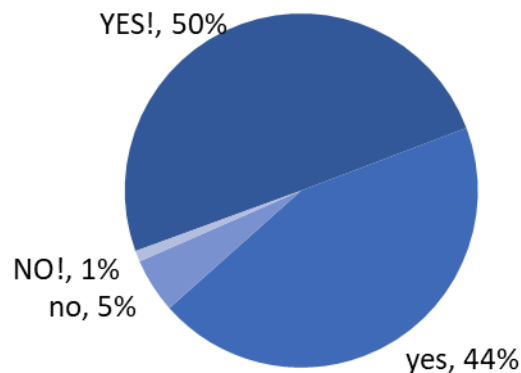
- ▶ Measure Bi: A minimum of 85% of participants report “very important” or “pretty important” at posttest.
- ▶ Overall, how important has this program been to you?
  - ▶ 92% very or pretty important



# Student Satisfaction Cont.

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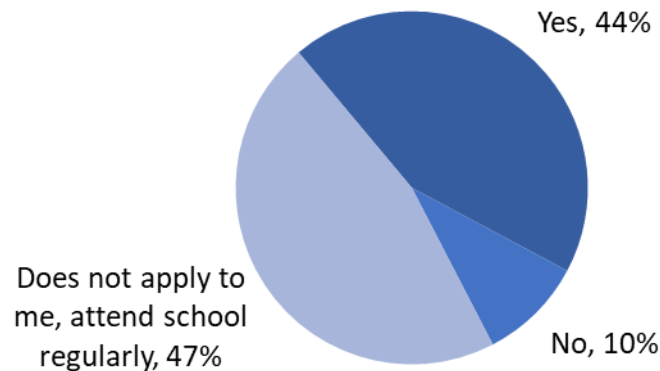
- ▶ Measure Bii: A minimum of 85% of participants report "YES!" or "yes" at posttest.
- ▶ Are you glad you participated in the program?:
  - ▶ 94% YES! or yes



# Student Satisfaction Cont.

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- ▶ Measure Biii: A minimum of 85% of participants report “yes” or “does not apply to me” at post-test.
- ▶ Are you more likely to attend school because of this program?
  - ▶ 90% yes or does not apply to me



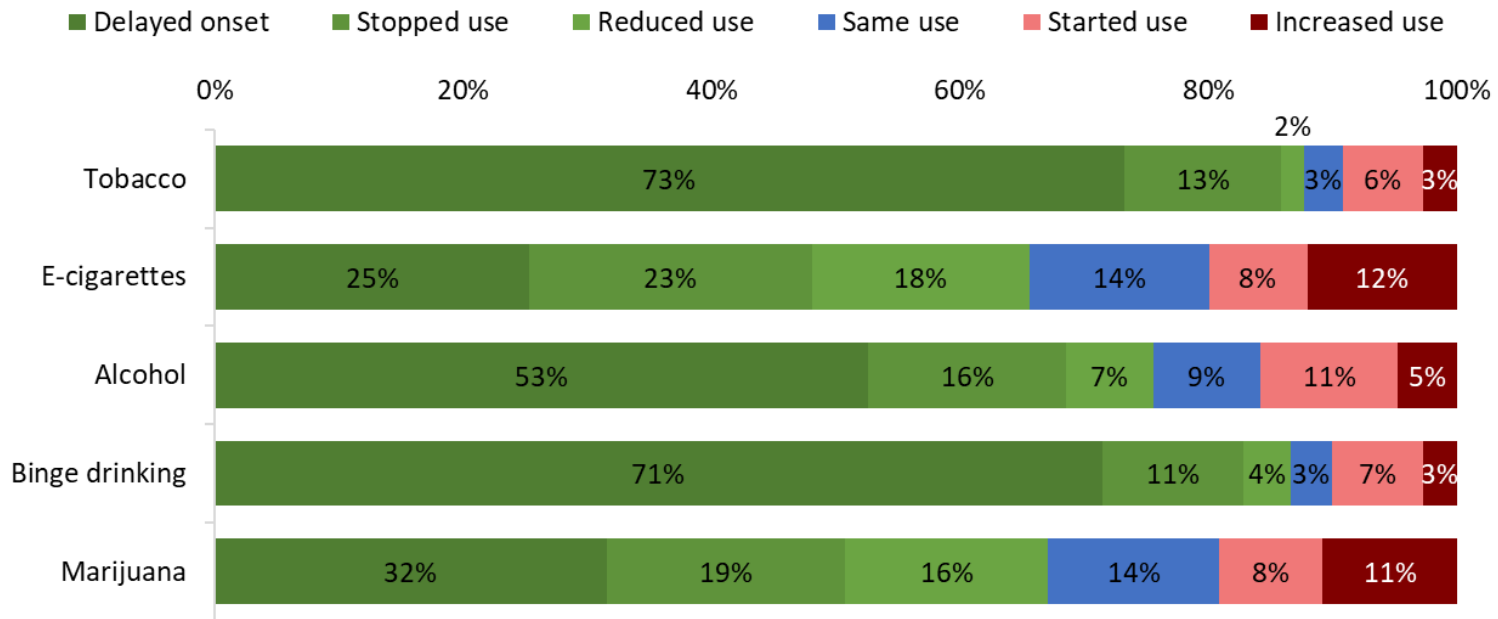
# Changes in Substance Use

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- ▶ Changes in substance use ~ with a substance use reduction goal
- ▶ Previous Measure: A minimum of 50% of the students participating in the program with substance abuse as a reduction goal reduce their use.
- ▶ 57% of participants had reduction goal and substance use was curbed\* by:
  - ▶ 88% for tobacco
  - ▶ 87% for binge drinking
  - ▶ 76% for alcohol
  - ▶ 67% for marijuana use
  - ▶ 66% for e-cigarettes



# Changes in Substance Use Cont.



Note. Grades 6 through 12 receiving a full intervention, n's vary by question from 1,405 to 1,415. \*Curbed = reduced use, stopped us, or delayed onset (no use in past 30 days at baseline or post).

<p>Can you please suggest places we can get data from other than the HYS?</p>	<p>Here are some ideas: Coroner or hospital data for things like overdose or alcohol poisoning. Disciplinary data from the high/middle school. Poison Center call data by county. Traffic Safety data from their dashboard or local Target Zero manager. Any data from your local Community Health Assessment, which is typically managed by your local health department staff. And any other sources that might seem relevant to your Big Picture of youth and community health.</p>

# Community Readiness

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Question	Answer
Are low turn outs, at events a sign there isnt community readiness for prevention?	It varies. Engaging in a community readiness assessment can be helpful in identifying this gap and correcting misalignment
