Washington PREP

- To decrease disproportionate teen birthrates in high-risk and vulnerable populations
- Serves ages 11-21
- Funded through the Affordable Care
 Act 2010
- Administered by Family and Youth Services Bureau





WA PREP for Healthy Youth Coordination

- Washington State Department of Health (DOH)
- Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS)
- Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI)
- CARDEA Services (training & technical assistance)





Intervention Partners

- Community-based organizations
- Juvenile detention facilities
- Schools
- Local Health Jurisdictions





Evidence Based Interventions

- Teen pregnancy prevention focus
- Preventing sexually transmitted infections, including HIV/AIDS
- EBI like a curriculum or program
 - Already proven to work through rigorous evaluation
 - Not the same as Research-Based Practice





WA PREP Evidence Based Interventions

¡Cuídate!

- Reduced frequency of sexual intercourse
- Reduced number of sexual partners
- Reduced incidence of unprotected sex
- · Increased condom use

Draw the Line/Respect the Line

- Decrease in sexual partners
- Increase knowledge in HIV
- · Increase condom use

Be Proud! Be Responsible!

- Reduced frequency of sex
- Reduced number of sexual partners
- · Increased condom use

Reducing the Risk

- Increased parent-child communication especially among Latino Youth
- Delayed initiation of sexual intercourse
- Reduced incidence of unprotected sex – among low risk youth

Sistas Informing, Healing, Living, and Empowering (SiHLE)

- Reduced number of new sexual partners
- Reduced incidence of unprotected sex
- · Increased condom use
- Long-term: Reduced incidence of STIs
- Long-term: Reduced incidence of pregnancy

Making Proud Choices

- Delayed initiation of sexual intercourse
- Reduced frequency of sex
- Reduced incidence of unprotected sex
- Increased condom use

SHAR

 Reduced incidence of unprotected sex – increased condom use





EBI Curriculum example: SHARP

- SHARP: Sexual Health & Adolescent Risk Prevention
- 4 5 hour implementation
 - Delivered in one day
 - Includes video, lecture, group discussion and activities

Outcomes:

- Reduced incidence of unprotected sex
- Increased condom usage





EBI Curriculum example: Be Proud! Be Responsible!

- Delivered over 6 sessions each lasting approximately 50 minutes
- Includes experiential activities to build skills in negotiation, refusal, and condom use

Outcomes:

- Reduced frequency of sex
- Reduced number of sexual partners
- Increased condom usage





WA PREP Process

- Application
- Conduct needs assessment
- Site visit
- Training
- Implementation of EBI





Evaluation Requirements

- Entry and Exit survey for students
- Facilitators complete fidelity monitoring logs after each session
- Facilitators complete survey about PREP
- CARDEA provides technical assistance





Intervention Partner Responsibilities

- Committed facilitators
- Attend trainings
- Deliver curriculum with fidelity
- Complete and submit evaluation materials
- Focus on sustainability


